## Speakers:

**SVEN TESKE**, Director of the Renewable Energy Campaign for Greenpeace International and co-author of energy [r]evolution scenario: australia. The scenario is modelled by Sven and Dr. Hugh Saddler, Managing Director of Canberra-based company. Energy Strategies and one of Australia's leading experts on energy and environmental policy. Sven will introduce the scenario and explain the modelling behind it.

**DR. MARK DIESENDORF**, Institute of Environmental Studies, UNSW. At various times Dr. Diesendorf has been a Principal Research Scientist at CSIRO, Professor of Environmental Science at UTS, and President of the Australia New Zealand Society for Ecological Economics. He is author of the new book, "Greenhouse Solutions with Sustainable Energy". Dr. Diesendorf will speak about the challenges and opportunities for implementing key solutions to climate change - such as energy efficiency and renewable energy - in the Australian political context.

**TIM AYRES** is the NSW Assistant Secretary of the Australian Manufacturing Workers' Union, which represents workers in both high emission industries and the potential growth areas in renewables and low emission products and technology. The AMWU believes that market based approaches to reducing carbon emissions must be supported by proactive government intervention to build a fair economy and society and ensure a just transition to a clean energy future.
